From the Principal

Welcome to 2010! We hope you enjoyed your break with friends, family, and cheer. The new year is off to a busy start. Korematsu will be implementing or participating in after-school intervention math classes, Oral Language Fair, Explorit Science Center visits, preparing for STAR testing in April, and staff training in language for teaching. We have only three months before spring break, and we hope that our strong student, teacher and parent relationships will continue to build and reinforce excellence.

Social Justice: Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. and Fred T. Korematsu

Martin Luther King Jr. Day is one of three federal holidays marking the birthday of an individual. Dr. King's birth date is January 15, but the holiday is observed on the third Monday of January. Observance of the holiday was signed into law by President Reagan in 1983.

A core theme or philosophy of our school is social justice, in recognition of school namesake Fred T. Korematsu. That makes Martin Luther King Jr. Day more meaningful for our school. The upcoming Oral Language Fair is one of our events to highlight the work of Dr. King and his impact on social justice and equality. In February we will be reflecting on the 'Day of Remembrance' and the work of Fred T. Korematsu and other civil rights activists.

This is a great time to discuss this theme with our students and the importance of celebrating diversity through inclusion and acceptance of all. As Dr. King has said, "We are inextricably bound."

Discuss with your child at home how we are all 'bound', connected to one another, and why this is important for our community.

Important Reminder:

Be Safe While Driving Near Our Kids

Introducing Counselor Susie Carrell

I am happy to introduce myself as your new school counselor, who will be on-site seven hours a week. The next few months I will be working with K-2nd grade students, either through classroom lessons or in small groups. Classroom lessons will focus primarily on learning how to problem solve, recognize emotions and how to deal with difficult emotions. Through stories, puppets and role plays students will have an opportunity to practice these social skills. A limited number of small groups will also be available for students who need additional support with social/emotional development. Additionally, teachers and recess staff will have an opportunity to learn about social skills taught in the classroom so that they may become familiar with the language and reinforce these skill sets at recess.

After completing lessons with K-2, I will focus my attention on classrooms or small groups of students who need additional support in the classroom.

My experience includes four years as a social worker with special needs children and families; tutoring; youth group and scout leader; and elementary school counselor for the past four years. As school counselor I've taught social skills, conflict resolution programs, anger management and peer helper programs through classroom guidance, small group and individual counseling.

I look forward to being part of the Korematsu family.
